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Photo 1 (Map Photo ID 121): Entrance onto the parcel from 19th Ave NE. This parcel was inhabited by squatters for more than a year, trashing the majority of the property.



Photo 2 (Map Photo ID 128): Northeast corner of the property, looking south down 19 Ave NE.









Photos 3&4 (Map Photo IDs 123 & 124): Tires, a battery, and garbage along the 19th Ave NE property line.



Photos 5 (Map Photo ID 131): Dig and fill areas along the forested boundary near the northern property line. Staff were unable to determine what was buried, or the purpose of the dig and fills.



Photos 6 (Map Photo ID 136): Garbage piles are strewn through the forested section of the northern property line, in addition to numerous piles of human feces.





Photo 7 (Map Photo ID 133): A large pile of tires along the northern property line. Again, piles of human feces are present.



Photo 8 (Map Photo ID 146): A burn pile near the near the center of the property.



Photo 9 (Map Photo ID 145): Numerous ransacked, broken down vehicles, all filled with trash, bags of feces, needles, etc. Staff were unable to determine if there were fluid leaks (e.g. petroleum products), however, no fumes were smelled.



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Photos10 & 11 (Map Photo ID 143 & 144): Burn pits near the center point of the property. Garbage appears to have been burnt.



Photo 12 (Map Photo ID 141): An overview of the central/eastern portion of the parcel, looking east towards 19th Ave NE. An RV was previously removed from this area. Garbage, burn piles, human feces, and needles were spread throughout this area.



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Photo 13 (Map Photo ID 119): Looking south towards the mobile home on the neighboring southern parcel.

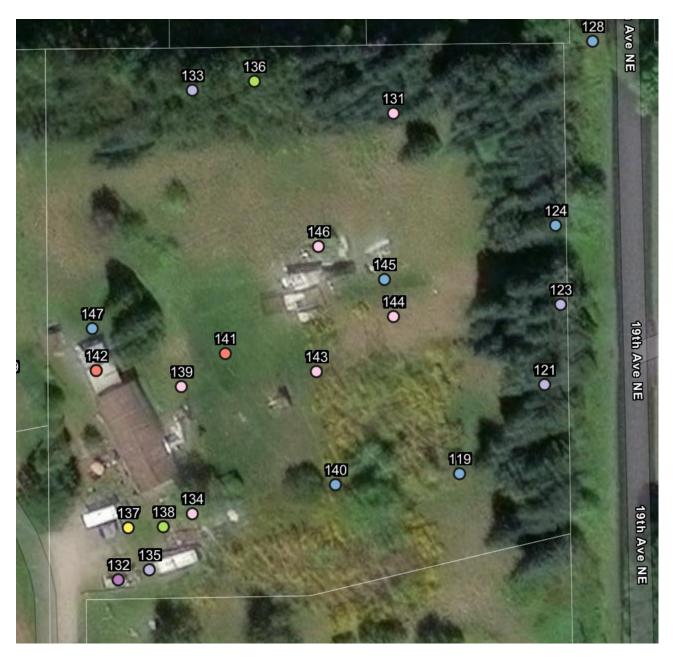
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Conclusion and Recommendation: This parcel has high concentrations of garbage and tire piles, burn pits, stained soils, broken down vehicles, human feces, and dig and fill areas. All areas mentioned above need to be properly disposed and cleaned up. Many areas need further exploration to ensure contamination is not present. **Risk Needs Further Investigation.**

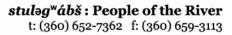

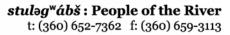

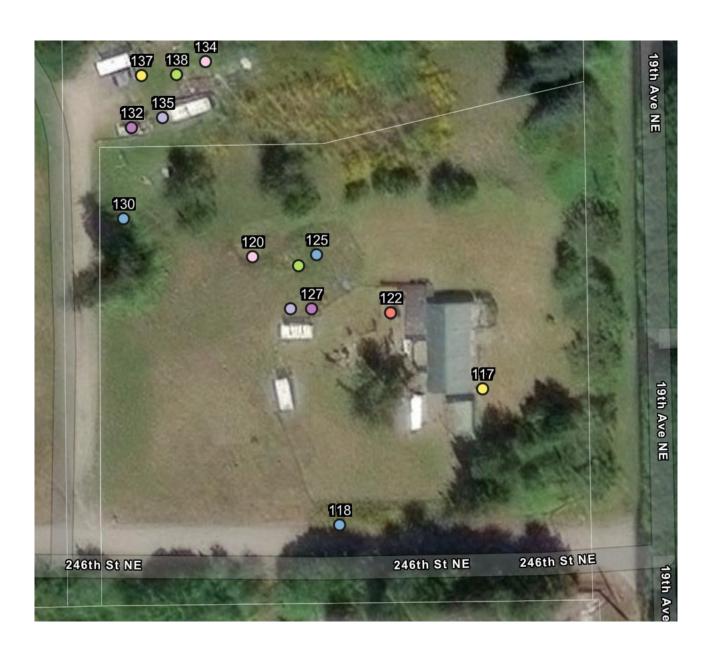

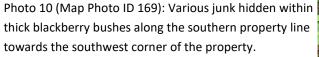

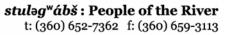

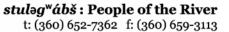

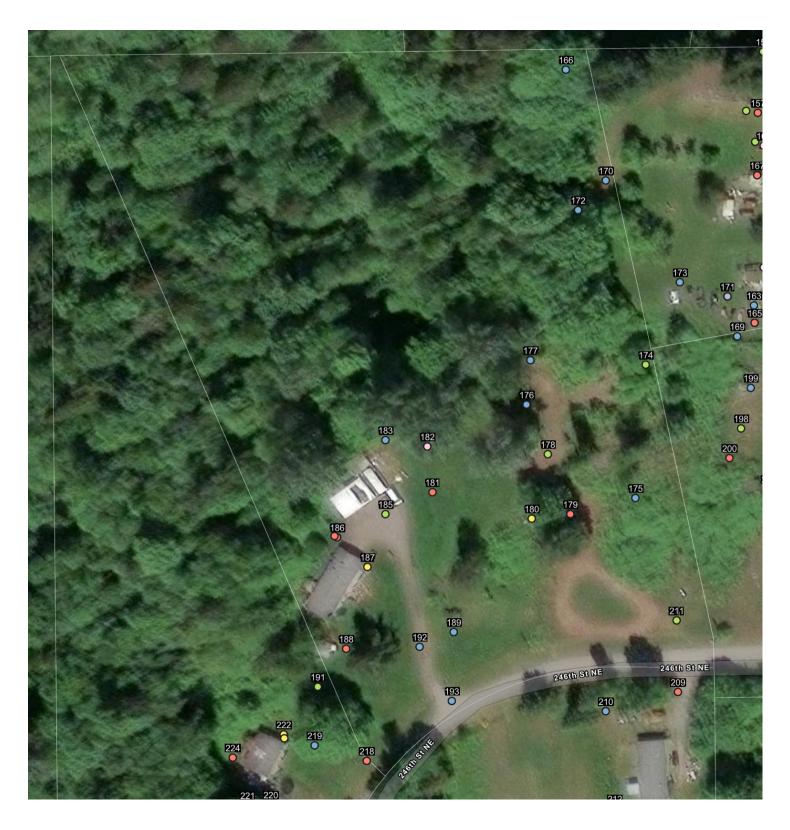

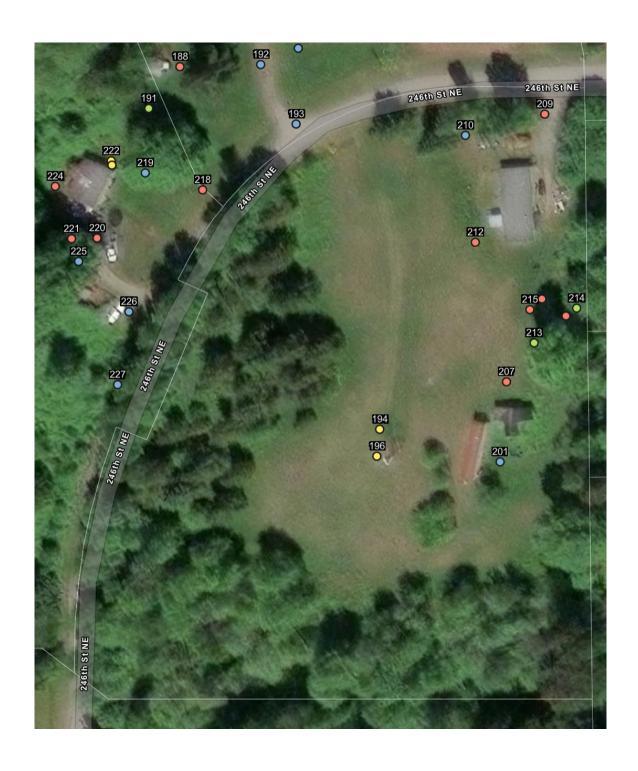

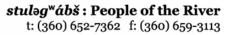

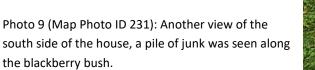

These parcels were densely vegetated and had a number of wetlands. The western property (Parcel ID: 32042500200200200) had a thick perimeter of blackberry that made in investigation near impossible (however, openings allowed investigation inside). Apart from two isolated areas of trash and the one abandoned vehicle on the eastern property (Parcel ID: 32042500100700, there were no obvious signs of other environmental hazards, beyond the BP Olympic Pipeline. Should this pipeline rupture, Tribal land would be immediately impacted. Otherwise, there is a **Low Level of Risk that can be Mitigated**.

Photo 2 (map photo ID 243): A low spot that is likely inundated with water during some parts of the year, found along the property line adjacent to Dahl Road.

Photo 4 (map Photo ID 245): Cleared area looking north, adjacent to Dahl Road.

Photos 19-21 (map Photo IDs: 257, 256, 255, respectively): A channelized wetland system which begins near the northeast corner of the property and flows south, eventually turning west near the centerline of the property. This channelized system likely enters the large wetland complex near the center of the property.



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Conclusion and Recommendation: These parcels were densely vegetated and had a number of wetlands. The western property (Parcel ID: 32042500200200) had a thick perimeter of blackberry that made in investigation near impossible (however, openings allowed investigation inside). Apart from two isolated areas of trash and the one abandoned vehicle on the eastern property (Parcel ID: 32042500100700, there were no obvious signs of other environmental hazards, beyond the BP Olympic Pipeline. Should this pipeline rupture, Tribal land would be immediately impacted. Otherwise, there is a **Low Level of Risk that can be Mitigated.**
